


#### **Celebrate someone special this Father's Day**

The General Election on Thursday 4 July is a make-or-break moment for nature. The UK has committed to halting the loss of our wildlife and protecting and managing 30% of our land and sea for nature by 2030. That's just six years away, so the decisions made by the next UK Government will play a crucial role in whether we hit these game-changing targets.

Right now, the UK is one of the most nature-depleted places on earth. We've lost 38 million birds from our skies in the last 50 years, and a quarter of all our mammals are at risk of extinction from the UK. But we can turn this round – if the next UK Government acts for nature. Let your candidates know they must urgently commit to protecting and restoring our natural world.

### **Celebrating our volunteers**


As part of Volunteers' Week, we celebrated the wonderful work of our volunteers with our annual Presidents' Award Ceremony.
